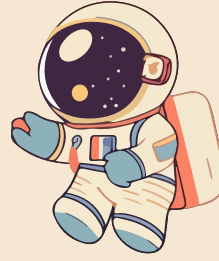

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Acorn Class Space Topic



Acorns class have had a very busy and exciting half term learning all about space. The children have initiated their own astronaut games in our 'space station' role play area, created space pictures and designed, described and named their own "puffy paint planets". In our P.E lessons the children have flown in their rockets and imagined what it would be like to walk on the moon. through construction activities, we have combined shapes and explored different resources to build 2D and 3D rockets. The children have also explored counting backwards for our rocket launch and acted out the story "whatever next!" by Jill Murphy!

Willow class have been making Mexican wraps to link their history topic of the Mayans with cooking skills in DT. Mrs Walker was very impressed with how they kneaded their dough, selected and prepped their ingredients (a lot of chilli was involved) and finally how they devoured their wraps!



Year 3/4 Science



In Year 3/4 science, pupils have been exploring different types of rocks and their properties. This week, the children carried out a practical investigation to test the permeability of rocks and discover which allow water to pass through.

they began by making thoughtful predictions, before carefully carrying out the experiment. Pupils worked scientifically by observing what happened and recording their findings in a data table. This hands-on investigation helped develop their enquiry skills and encouraged them to think like scientists while deepening their understanding of rock properties.





The Blue Umbrella



In English this half term, Birch class have been exploring the short animated film The Blue Umbrella as a stimulus for imaginative writing. Pupils delved into the story's characters, setting and emotions before bringing the film to life by re-enacting key scenes using their own umbrellas. This hands-on approach helped the children to deepen their understanding of the narrative and think carefully about how to describe action, atmosphere and feelings in their writing. The room was full of creativity, energy and enthusiasm, and we can't wait to read the wonderfully imaginative stories they produce next week.

- What happens if nature changes?

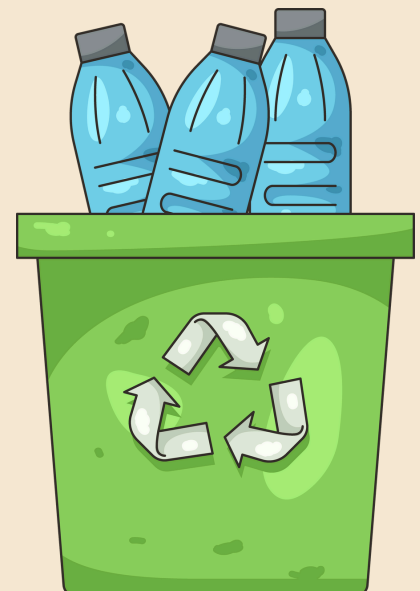
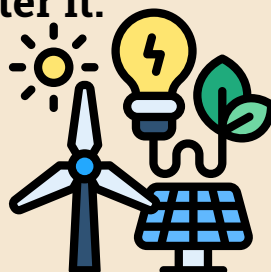
**David Attenborough believes every living thing matters – big or small.

Dear Parents and Carers,

We are delighted to launch Primary Platform 26, a new Anglian Learning exhibition, celebrating the creativity of every primary pupil across our 14 primary schools.

Building on the success of the secondary Platform events, which have been running since 2019, this is our first dedicated primary exhibition. From Reception to Year 6, pupils explore the theme of 'Belonging' - a powerful concept that every child deserves to explore and express. This supports Anglian Learning's Belonging by Design strategy by creating meaningful opportunities for pupils to explore how they feel included, valued, and connected within their school communities. Research shows that when children experience a strong sense of belonging, their confidence, wellbeing, and engagement all increase. We aim to ensure Primary Platform 26 becomes a vibrant celebration that reflects the work taking place in our primary classrooms.

The project began with an official launch at Kettle's Yard, where Art Leads from all primary schools worked alongside Dr Harold Offeh and the Kettle's Yard team. Each school will contribute a selection of artwork to the final exhibition.

As part of this celebration of the arts, the final exhibition will also feature a special video presentation of the Inspire25 event. This project saw over 500 pupils join forces with the Stapleford Granary Arts Centre for an immersive creative experience inspired by The Tin Forest. Seeing this video will be a wonderful opportunity to witness the power of collaboration across our Trust schools.

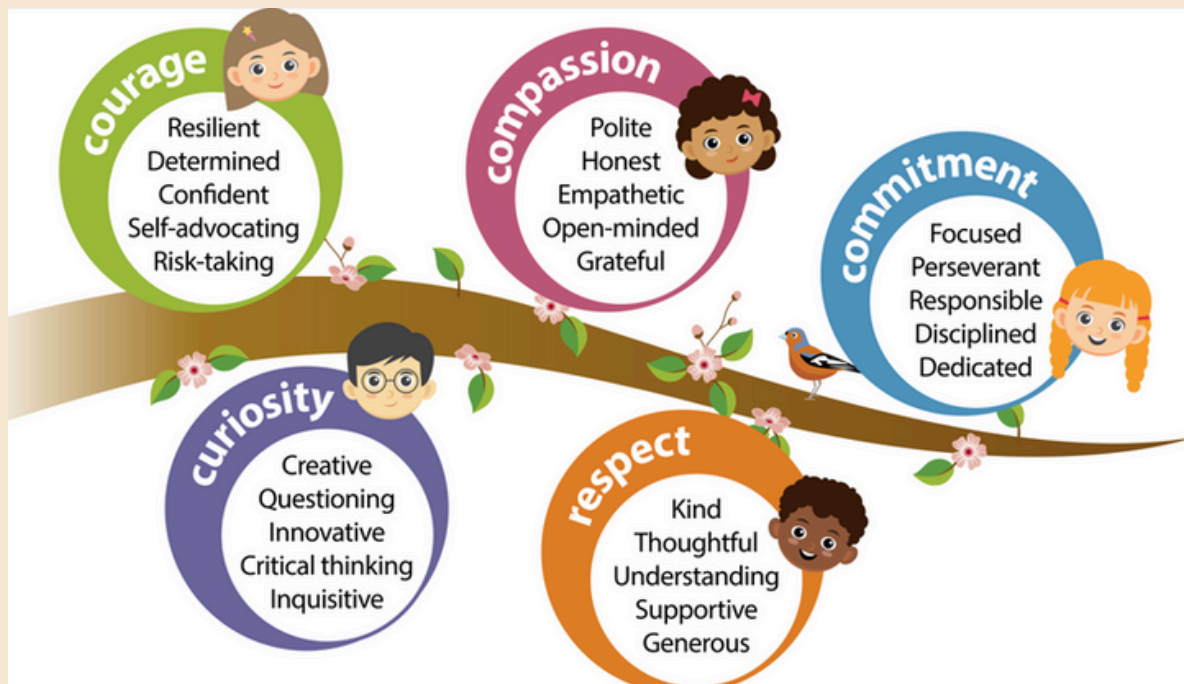

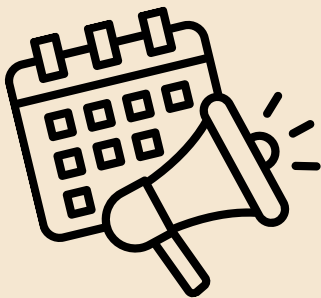
